

Make or Do?

Remember:

Use "**do**" for actions, obligations, repetitive tasks, and personal grooming or beautification routines.

Use "**make**" for creating, producing, preparing something and for generating or achieving outcomes such as wealth, opportunities, or conditions.

Examples:

Do your makeup.

Did you **do** your homework? (Action/Obligation)

I need to **do** my hair. (personal grooming or beautification)

Let's **make** a cake. (Creating/Producing)

We don't **make** a lot of money. (generating wealth)
