

<p>Other (additional or extra', or 'alternative', or 'different types of)</p> <p>We can use <i>other</i> with singular uncountable nouns and with plural nouns: <i>Some music calms people; other music has the opposite effect.</i> (different types of music) <i>What other books by Dickens have you read, apart from 'Oliver Twist'?</i> (additional or extra books)</p> <p>If we use <i>other</i> before a singular countable noun, we must use another determiner (the, this, that, my, his, one, first, no... etc) before it: <i>I don't like the red one. I prefer the other colour.</i> <i>Jeremy is at university; our other son is still at school</i></p>	<p>.Other as a pronoun We can use <i>other</i> as a pronoun. As a pronoun, <i>other</i> has also a plural form, <i>others</i>: <i>We have to solve this problem, more than any other, today.</i> <i>I'll attach two photos to this email and I'll send others tomorrow.</i></p>
<p>The other We can use <i>other</i> with singular nouns and with plural nouns: The other with a plural noun means the remaining people or things in a group or set: <i>This computer here is new. The other computer is about five years old.</i> The other with a plural noun means the remaining people or things in a group or set: <i>Joel and Karen are here, but where are the other kids?</i> (the remaining people in a group) <i>Where are the other two dinner plates? I can only find four.</i> (the remaining things in a set – here six plates)</p>	<p>The other as a pronoun We can use <i>the other</i> as a pronoun, especially to refer back to something which has been mentioned already in the sentence: <i>He had his hat in one hand and a bunch of flowers in the other.</i> <i>She has two kittens, one is black and the other is all white.</i></p>
<p>Another means 'one more', another one, or 'an additional or extra', or 'an alternative or different'. We use <i>another</i> with singular nouns: <i>Would you like another cup of tea?</i> <i>There is another car park a little further down the same street</i></p>	<p>Another as a pronoun We can use <i>another</i> as a pronoun: <i>The applications are examined by one committee, then passed on to another.</i> <i>I have already eaten two sandwiches though now I want another one.</i></p>
