Explore Calgary

Read the following passage. Discuss any words or ideas that you are not familiar with before moving on. It may be a good idea to take notes on anything you're unsure of! The bolded words will be covered in Exercise 1.

Calgary is a city in the Canadian province of Alberta. It is located in an area of foothills and prairie, about 80 km east of the Canadian Rockies.

The city had a population of 1.2 million in 2016, making it Alberta's largest city and Canada's third-largest **municipality**. In 1988, Calgary became the first Canadian city to host the Winter Olympic Games.

The land that the city of Calgary currently sits on is full of history. The Calgary area was **inhabited** by pre-Clovis people whose presence has been traced back at least 11,000 years. Before the arrival of Europeans, the area was home to different native tribes. These tribes included the Blood, Blackfoot, Peigan and the Tsuu Tina peoples.

Remember how Jasper was a fur-trading post? Well, Calgary was similar! The area became a post for the North-West Mounted Police (now the **Royal Canadian Mounted Police or RCMP**). The police detachment was sent here in 1875 to protect the western plains from US whiskey traders, and to protect the fur trade.

As the post grew, a railroad was built. This led to the steady growth of Calgary. In 1947, Alberta's **oil industry boomed**, giving the people in Calgary more and more jobs. There was so much success in the **oil industry** that thousands of people moved to Calgary. In fact, the city's highest population growth was during the most successful years of the oil industry in Alberta. While people made a lot of money off of oil in Alberta, oil prices in the USA and Saudi Arabia have caused a lot of people to lose their jobs. As the province refuses to move towards green energy, a lot of Calgary's citizens are struggling to find work.

Because of this, Calgary finds itself a home to **controversy**. Today, while we learn about Calgary, we will also learn how to express opinions and facts.

A view of the Calgary skyline. In the west, you can see the distant Rocky Mountains. To the east, the land flattens into the prairies. The large, skinny tower near the center is the Calgary Tower. The Calgary Tower opened in 1968. While it is no longer the tallest building in Downtown, the Calgary Tower's observation deck offers a stunning view of the city.



The view from Calgary Tower in downtown Calgary. As buildings continue to be built throughout downtown Calgary, the view from the tower is constantly changing. From this view, you can see exactly how flat the land is surrounding Calgary.





East of Calgary, but still in view of the Rocky Mountains, are the prairies. The prairies are a large span of flat land. While there are some hills, they are usually not very big. The prairies are home to thousands of farms. You will find a lot of cows and horses living on the farmland here.
