When you cut or scratch your skin, the red stuff that comes out is your blood. Blood is very important, and it is supposed to stay inside you! But what exactly is blood? What is blood for?

All humans and most animals have blood inside their bodies. Blood is made up of tiny parts called cells. Red blood cells carry oxygen around the body, and white blood cells attack and destroy invaders such as bacteria and viruses that can cause sickness.

Blood also contains materials to heal the cuts. The materials stick together to stop the blood from flowing out. A liquid in blood carries things such as nutrients around the body.

Your heart's job is to pump blood around your body. When doing so, it beats in a steady rhythm. If you listen to someone's chest, you will hear a bump-bump sound called a heartbeat. The tubes that move blood from the heart around the body are blood vessels including arteries and veins. Squeeze your hand to make a tight fist. Look at your wrist. You can see your arteries and veins at work!

There are different types of blood. Blood type is based on the kind of red blood cells you have, such as type A, B, AB, or O. If a person has an accident and loses a lot of blood, a person called a donor can give him or her blood. A donor's blood type must match the blood type of the person receiving the blood. Do you know what your blood type is?
