Adventures on your doorstep

As a full-time adventurer, Alastair Humphreys cycled 46,000 miles around the world, crossed Iceland and completed a 150-mile run across the Sahara Desert, to mention just three of his achievements. But in 2011, he gave himself a different kind of challenge: to break down the elitism in adventure and inspire people to find ways of having everyday adventures. He thought about the kind of activities that everyone could join in and came up with the idea of microadventures.

Humphreys spent a year trying out small, local trips that began and ended at his doorstep. He made short videos of his experiences and posted them on social media, challenging everyone to try out their own microadventures. Humphreys began his new project by going on a hike along the main motorway that goes around London. It was January, cold and snowy; the walk was physically challenging. However, he saw beautiful places and met interesting people. He concluded that the hike ticked all of the boxes that his four-year bike trip around the world ticked. It had been a genuine adventure.

The first challenge he set for other people was to enter a race, for example, a five-mile race. The second challenge was to break the routine by going away for a spontaneous weekend – meet some friends and go to climb a hill, for example.

The idea was that it was possible to have an

adventure anywhere because it's really just a state of mind. He wanted people to reverse the idea of the nine-to-five life, the office life, and instead to think about the other sixteen hours of the day – what can you do in your five-to-nine? You could, for example, take a train, sleep on top of a hill, wake up, jump in a lake then jump on the train and be back home by nine o'clock. That's what Humphreys did on his first five-to-nine microadventure.

Since those early trips, Humphreys' list of challenges to others has grown every year. Some of them, such as finding a river to go swimming in, sound more like the traditional idea of adventure. He himself spent two days swimming down the River Thames, sleeping on the river bank. But the list also includes things you can do close to home. You could sleep in your garden for a night (with or without a tent) or forage for edible plants in your neighbourhood. You could pick a random point on a map of your area and go and visit it. Perhaps you have climbed a hill or been to a new place near to where you live – now do it again but in the dark.

Humphreys thinks that in many ways it is totally pointless to climb Mount Everest, risking your life, just to turn back around again at the top. It's not really about what you do, just that you do something. All adventure is a means for getting to the more important things in life.
