Expressions Tell All

Yael Davids works for airport security. This morning she and her partner are interviewing the travelers before they check in their bags. Yael's partner has caught sight of a man who is standing at the back of the line. He seems nervous and he is acting strangely. She senses a problem, so she calls Yael on the radio.

- ⁵ When Yael began working as a security guard at the airport, she got special training. One of the things she learned was how to read faces. She learned about micro expressions. These are tiny changes in a person's face. They express emotions such as happiness, sadness, anger, fear or surprise.

According to Professor Paul Ekman, an expert on emotions, people have 43 face muscles and ¹⁰ they can make up to 10,000 micro expressions. Airport security workers learn to "read" these expressions. They can tell if a person is lying or telling the truth. They can even tell what a person is feeling.

- Yael walks over to the man. He is sweating. Yael asks the man about the purpose of his trip. When he answers, he giggles and says that he is going to New York to surprise his girlfriend. ¹⁵ Yael studies his face. As she questions him, he smiles, but the muscles in his cheeks don't move. He looks at the floor, ashamed. Yael realizes that the man is nervous because he hates flying. The danger is over. She thanks the man for answering her questions and moves on to the next traveler.


Present Progressive
