A **clause** is a group of words that has a subject and a verb.

An **independent clause** expresses a complete thought. This type of clause may be a complete sentence, or it may be part of a sentence.

Examples: Not much was left but dust. When the rains stopped coming and the soil blew away, not much was left but dust.

A dependent clause does not express a complete thought. It must be part of a sentence and cannot stand alone. A dependent clause by itself is called a fragment.

Example: When the rains stopped coming and the soil blew away

The following words often begin a dependent clause: when, after, because, before, if, and although.
