THE 'CHUNNEL'

Until 1994, if you wanted to go from London to Paris but you didn't want to fly, you got a train to Dover, then a boat to Calais, and then a train to Paris. The journey was about nine hours.



But in 1994, the 'Chunnel', or the Channel Tunnel, opened. It is a rail tunnel, 37.9 kilometres long, which goes under the English Channel – the sea that separates England from France. Today you can travel from London to Paris on a Eurostar train, and it **only** takes about three hours!

People first **thought** of building a tunnel between England and France in 1802. But the project only started in 1988, and it cost £4,650 million, 80% more than the original prediction.

Travelling on the Eurostar is usually a very fast and **safe** way of getting from England to Europe. But in 2009 it snowed a lot in England and France and five trains stopped in the middle of the tunnel because the snow caused electrical problems. Two thousand people were in the tunnel for 16 hours!
