The power of gossip

Humans are one of the most successful animals in the world. We have become the most powerful, most important species on the planet, and of course, we have become one of the most intelligent. We have created films, books, buildings, businesses, the internet and many other complicated and beautiful things. So what is the secret of our success? What makes us different from other animals, which have achieved none of these things? The answer might surprise you.

Humans have been able to talk or communicate for a very long time. Early humans could tell each other where to find the best food, or to communicate about dangerous

things. However, this did not make humans special. Many animals can do this, too.

The real change was when humans learned to gossip. This means chatting to other people, talking about other people's private lives – and sharing information about them. People learned to talk about what other people were like, who was honest, who was important or not important, in the same way that we now gossip about people around us or TV stars.

This change was important. Since humans first started to gossip, we have thought of ourselves as part of a much larger group of hundreds or thousands of people. Earlier, humans only remembered information about their close family. We developed the

idea of being part of a society and we needed to concentrate on more and more information.

Some scientists believe that gossip also helped humans to get better at imagining things. When we gossip about another person, that person is usually not there, in front of us. It is quite easy to talk about things we can see or hear, but talking about things which are only in our memory or our imagination is actually very complicated. It is possible that we are the only animals that can do this.

So, as humans learned to gossip, our brains got larger and larger. We also developed more and more language skills. So, the next time someone tells you that gossiping about people is bad, they might be wrong!
