Sound of rescue helicopter brings joy to the stranded

A flood victim in Nopphitam district in Nakhon Si Thammarat says she was jubilant when she heard the hum of helicopter rotors over the horizon while awaiting an airlift at the peak of a knoll, overlooking homes inundated by flood water and mud. "I am speechless – all I can say is that I am still alive and have a chance to see my children again," said a tearful Saowakhon Jansri.

After being admitted into a relief shelter, she said the entire village in tambon Krung Ching was cut off and under heavy rain for seven days, but her children at the province's Walailak University had notified authorities of the incident and coordinated help and eventually the airlift.

The villagers relied on grass and vegetation to survive for the seven-day period after they were cut out from the outside world. The situation got even worse when mobile-phone signals died after the electricity went out, and landline phones were also down.

She said it was the heaviest rain she had ever witnessed, and thunder struck frequently. "The constant loud noise of flash floods around the village was frightening, and kept everyone awake," she added.

The last floods struck homes built in lower-lying areas, before the villagers ran up to Saowakhon's home at the top of the hill to find their last high ground.

"They gathered at my home, about 60 of them, to wait for a day or two. We brought together dry food to cook and share, before we ran out of it and turned to vegetation."

"We are lucky that there was a mobile-phone tower nearby still capable of transmitting. We relied on this as the only communication channel to my children, who got help to us at last," she said.

Couple robbed at fake checkpoint

A group of about 10 men dressed in military uniforms robbed a man and his wife of 100,000 baht in cash and their pickup truck at a fake checkpoint in Narathiwat's Rueso district early on Friday, police say.

Pol Lt Srithanont Samlee, a duty officer from Rueso district police, said the hold-up took place at about 4am near Sawo village in tambon Rueso Ok on the Rueso-Jakua Road.

Police found the wife, Jintana Tinsan, 42, nearby on the same road not far from the scene of the robbery.

Mrs Jintana told police that while she and her husband, Pichai Tinsan, 54, had been travelling in their pickup

truck from their home in tambon Rueso to buy food from a market in Yala town they were stopped at a mobile checkpoint and searched by about 10 men dressed as soldiers.

The men forced the two out of the vehicle at gunpoint and struck their heads and faces with rifle butts.

The assailants then put them on the back of the truck and drove the vehicle toward Raman district of Yala.

On the way, Mrs Jintana was removed from the pickup and left by the roadside, where she was found by the police.

The police later found the husband lying unconscious in bushes about 50 metres from a rubber wood processing factory.

The bandits fled with the pickup truck and 100,000 baht cash.

Thai Oil enjoying higher margins

Thai Oil, Thailand's largest refiner, is likely to revise up its operating profit this year from the previous projection of Bt8.08 billion thanks to sharply increased margins on diesel, jet fuel and paraxylene.

President and CEO Surong Bulakul yesterday said the company was confident its revenue in the first half of this year would be much higher than the same period last year after the government allowed it to increase the price for liquefied petroleum gas (LPG). Margins on diesel, jet fuel and paraxylene have also soared.

The company's gross refining margin (GRM) for LPG has increased by 70 cents per barrel. Thai Oil will increase LPG production capacity from 17,000 tonnes last year to 35,000 tonnes.

He said margins on diesel, jet fuel and paraxylene spread had risen after the tsunami and quake disaster in Japan caused four of that country's 27 refineries to halt operations.

About 60-70 per cent of Thai Oil's refinery capacity of 275,000 barrels is diesel and jet fuel.

Surong added that diesel's GRM is now US\$23 (Bt696) per barrel compared with \$7 in the first quarter of last year. Jet fuel's GRM is currently \$20 per barrel, compared with \$9.40 per barrel last year. Paraxylene spread is about \$400-\$500 per tonne, up from \$286 last year.

Thai Oil has a five-year investment budget of \$1.5 billion. Investment projects will include refinery upgrades to meet the Euro IV standard, which will take \$4 million to \$5 million, and increasing paraxylene capacity by 100,000 tonnes from the current 489,000.

192 nations to discuss climate fund

A global fund to mitigate the impact of climate change will top the agenda of talks in Bangkok starting tomorrow.

Thailand is hosting the 16th session of the ad hoc working group for Annex I Parties under the Kyoto Protocol (AWG-KP 16) and the 14th session of the ad hoc working group on long-term cooperative action (AWG-LCA 14), which both run until Friday.

Representatives from 192 countries are expected to attend the six-day talks.

An Office of Natural Resources and Environmental Policy and Planning official said the Green Climate Fund is expected to dominate the sessions.

The fund's establishment was adopted by heads of state and governments at climate change talks in Copenhagen in 2009. It aims to support immediate action on climate change, including adaptation, finance, technology and reducing emissions from deforestation in developing countries.

"At the Bangkok climate talks, we expect that representatives from Asia and Latin America will be selected to sit on the transitional committee, which is a key unit to draft regulations for the Green Climate Fund," said the source.

According to rough guidelines on the fund's management, a minimum of US\$1 billion will be raised each year from public and private sectors from 2020.

Jacques-Chai Chomthongdi of the Thai Working Group for Climate Justice said the TCJ will rally in front of the meeting venue at the United Nations building on Ratchadamnoen Nok Avenue to call on parties to the climate change pact to ensure fair treatment for rich and poor nations over climate impact.

Flood-hit oil palm growers want help

Oil palm and rubber growers in the flood-hit southern provinces are asking the government to help them pay for damages to their crops.

Thawee Srisukhron, chairman of the Association of Palm Oil and Oil Palm Producers, said flash floods had uprooted many palm trees, especially younger ones, used for lucrative palm oil production, in the South.

The cost of the damage has yet to be estimated.

Abbreviation is shortened form of word or phrase. It consists of a group of letters taken from the word or phrase. Abbreviation can be shortened by many methods. Contraction is a reduction of size by the drawing together of the parts. A contraction of a word is made by omitting certain letters or syllables and bringing together the first and last letters or elements; an abbreviation may be made by omitting certain portions from the interior or by cutting off a part. These are some important abbreviations in newspaper:
