FRIENDLY REMINDER!



DEMONSTRATIVES



USE:

Remember we make questions with demonstratives to know the name of an object or to clear our doubts as regards the characteristics of the objects.

GRAMMAR:

For making questions, we place the verb BE first + the demonstrative + the optional object we are asking about.

IS + THIS + (OBJECT)
THAT
ARE + THESE + (OBJECT)
THOSE

For replying questions with this structure, we say:

YES, IT IS / NO, IT ISN'T

YES, THEY ARE / NO, THEY AREN'T

With negative replies, we can add extra information. For example:

Is that an air conditioner?
No, it isn't. It is a heater.

Are those new shoes?
No, they aren't. They are old shoes.

THERE IS / ARE



USE:

Remember we make questions with there is / there are to ask about the existence of an object in a place or the availability of any object.

GRAMMAR:

For making questions with this structure, we place the verb BE first + the word THERE + the object we want to know about.

IS + THERE + OBJECT

ARE + THERE + OBJECT

For replying questions with this structure, we say:

YES, THERE IS // NO, THERE ISN'T

YES, THERE ARE // NO, THERE AREN'T

With negative replies, we can add extra information. For example:

Is there a cupboard in the bathroom?
No, there isn't. There is a vanity.

Are there six chairs in the kitchen?
No, there aren't. There are three chairs in the kitchen.
