

PREPOSITIONS OF TIME

We use <i>at</i> for the time and some expressions. <i>at</i> 8.00 <i>at</i> midnight <i>at</i> lunchtime <i>at</i> the weekend <i>at</i> Christmas <i>at</i> the same time <i>at</i> the moment <i>at</i> the age of five	We use <i>in</i> for longer periods of time. <i>in</i> April <i>in</i> 2012 <i>in</i> summer <i>in</i> the twentieth century We also use <i>in</i> for parts of the day. <i>in</i> the morning <i>in</i> the afternoon <i>in</i> the evening (but <i>at</i> night)
We use <i>on</i> for days and dates. <i>on</i> Monday <i>on</i> Sunday morning <i>on</i> August 17 <i>on</i> Thursdays	There is no preposition before <i>last, next, this, tomorrow, or yesterday</i>. I saw him <i>this</i> morning I'll see you <i>next</i> week Did you go out <i>last</i> night / <i>yesterday</i> evening? I'll call you <i>tomorrow</i> morning.
