The Evolution of the Olympic Games

From Ancient Greece to the modern era

1. The first evidence of the Olympics is from Ancient Greece in 776 BC. During the games, different states stopped fighting each other and competed in sports. This continues today. The first events happened every four years to praise the god, Zeus. However, in 393 AD, the Roman Emperor Theodosius I stopped the Olympic Games for religious reasons.
2. People tried to start an international sporting event at the end of the 19th century, and they finally began again in Athens, in 1896. 14 countries and 241 athletes competed in the games. They were all European, or living in Europe, except for the United States team. In 1948, Sir Ludwig Guttman, a doctor at Stoke Mandeville Hospital, was looking for a way to help his patients. As a result, he started the Stoke Mandeville Games. In 1960, these games were held in the same city as the Olympic Games, Rome, one week later. This event is seen as the first Paralympic Games.
3. In the 1990s, a new idea was added to the Olympic Charter*. The Olympic Games needed to be seen not only as a sporting event – it must also have a positive impact on society. From then on, to be selected, cities needed to have a long-term plan. The Olympics continues to move with the times. This means that different sports are added at each games, such as surfing and breakdancing in Paris in 2024.
