



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## Teacher profile

Angela Barns



Our teacher this week is Angela Barns. She <sup>1</sup> ... a teacher but she doesn't work in a school.

'I teach young actors in the theatre in London. My job is called tutoring.'

I work with children aged between nine and fourteen. They are all actors <sup>2</sup> ... they are students, too! This week I have two children. They don't work before seven <sup>3</sup> ... the morning or after seven in the evening.

The children don't have a regular school day. It starts at seven o'clock, when they get up and <sup>4</sup> ... breakfast. They come to the theatre at 7.30 and work for four hours, then they have lunch. Then they study with me for three hours in the afternoon. They do their homework in the evening or in their breaks. Some child actors have extra lessons on Saturdays or Sundays.

I don't teach the children in a classroom. We use the dining room at the theatre.

Working as a tutor is very different from working in a normal school. I don't see other teachers and my day doesn't finish <sup>5</sup> ... 3.30 like the students. But I love my job!'
