Future Perfect Simple	
The future perfect simple is a verb tense used for actions that will be completed before some point in the future. To form the future perfect tense use will have + past participle of the main verb .	
Affirmative	Negative
I <i>will have studied</i> hard. He <i>will have made</i> a million dollars.	I <i>won't have studied</i> hard. He <i>won't have made</i> a million dollars.
Sentences in future perfect simple and sentences in simple future tense often have the same meaning.	
<i>Ex.</i> Margaret <i>will leave</i> before you arrive. Margaret <i>will have left</i> before you arrive.	
Future perfect tense is most often used to show sequence with prepositions.	
<i>Ex.</i> At 6 p.m., Margaret <i>will leave</i> . (This means Margaret <i>will wait until 6 p.m. to leave</i> .) Margaret <i>will have left</i> by 6 p.m. (This means Margaret <i>will leave before 6 p.m.</i>)
