Use <i>There is</i> and <i>There are</i> to talk about things that you can see or that exist.	
Statements	Questions
There <b>is</b> a beautiful park in Springfield. There <b>isn't</b> a park in Livingston.	<b>Is there</b> a beautiful park in Springfield? Yes, <b>there is</b> .
There <b>are</b> people in the park. There <b>aren't</b> <u>any</u> ducks in the park.	<b>Are there</b> any ducks in the park? No, <b>there aren't</b> .
Use <i>any</i> with negative statements or with questions that use plurals or uncountable nouns.
