April 15 is a well-known date in the United States. Every year on this day, everyone who ~~work~~ ^{works} must file his or her income-tax forms with both the federal and state governments. Filing these forms are no easy task. First, a person needs to decide which forms to file. For federal income taxes, there is a long form for people who wishes to itemize their deductions. This form have at least five supplementary parts, called "schedules," and a person must decide which of these, if any, to file as well. Then there is a short form for people who plans to take the "standard" deduction, one that have been pre-calculated and is the same for everyone. The state income-tax forms are separate forms, and these must also be filed. In California, there is at least four supplementary schedules that a person may need to fill out. Some Americans feel that the attitude of survivalists is selfish and greed. These people say that such a philosophy turns society into a “dog-eat-dog” race for life. Other people believe that after a nuclear war, the world, with radiation and where there would be disease, wouldn’t be worth living in.
