Safe Lifting tips



One of the biggest causes of back injury at work is lifting heavy objects incorrectly.

Think before you lift.

Plan the lift. Where are you going to place the load? How heavy is it? Can you lift it on your own or will you need help?

Keep the load close to your body.

Get a good hold of the object. When you lift, hold the object close to your stomach rather than at arm's length. This reduces stress to your back.

Don't bend your back when lifting.

Bend your knees and keep your back straight. Use your legs to lift because your leg muscles are the strongest in your body.

Remember to use the same techniques when putting the load down.

Chester Zoo – the story of the UK's most popular zoo

By John Brown

June Mottershead was only four when her dad decided to open the world's first "zoo without bars". She remembers the day when they moved from Shevington near Crewe to a big, old, derelict house near Chester. "No curtains, nothing on the floors." The next day her father came home with two bears.

They repaired the house and built pens for the animals, and in 1931 Chester Zoo opened to the public.

Her father hated seeing animals kept in cages so the animals were allowed a lot of freedom.

The war years were difficult times but after the war the zoo began to grow.

"We all did the work. Building things, feeding animals, mucking out, and making sure they all had clean fresh water to drink."

In 1949 June got married and, apart from a three year trip to Australia and New Zealand, she worked in the zoo until 1978 when she and her husband moved to Anglesey. June is now in her 80's and still remembers her life with the animals. "It's funny. I didn't know anything different. I thought that everybody lived with lions and monkeys."

The amazing story of Chester Zoo has now been made into a TV drama for BBC 1.
