

WE USE TAG QUESTIONS...

- When we expect the person we are speaking to “to agree” with us:
 - The movie was amazing, **wasn't it?**
- Like real questions, when we are not sure about something and want to check:
 - You come from France, **don't you?**

STRUCTURE

- We use tag questions at the end of a Statement
- We form question tags with: **an auxiliary verb** (be, have, do, etc.) + **a personal pronoun** (you, she, they, etc.).
- If there is an auxiliary verb in the statement, we repeat it in the question tag:

- When the statement is positive, we use a negative question tag.



Positive statement



Negative tag question

You have lived in Guatemala for a long time, **haven't you?**

- When the statement is negative, we use a positive question tag.

Positive tag question

He didn't like the trip to the beach, **did he?**
