

Australia — famous places



Ayers Rock (also called **Uluru**) is the largest rock in the world. It takes two hours to walk around it. Uluru changes colour at different times of day and in different weather. To see an orange rock visitors must get up early as this is the colour usually seen at dawn. During the day, the rock can be blue or silver. At sunset, it becomes red.



Sydney's most famous building is **Sydney Opera House**. The roof looks like the sails of a ship blowing in the wind. People have enjoyed concerts and plays here since 1973. The Opera House overlooks Sydney Harbour and is close to the **Sydney Harbour Bridge**, one of the world's biggest bridges.



The Great Barrier Reef,

on the eastern coast of Australia, is the world's largest coral reef. The reef is so big, you can see it from outer space!



The reef has many different animals, from tiny brightly-coloured fish to great white sharks and whales. The warm, clear water around the reef brings two million tourists each year. These visitors can see marine life close up by snorkelling or diving. Boat cruises are also popular. Glass-bottomed boats allow tourists to see beneath the waves without getting wet.



Located on the east coast, the **Gold Coast** is a major tourist destination. Visitors come for the sunny weather and beautiful beaches, where they can go surfing or watch penguins and whales. There are also theme parks and exciting nightlife.
