

In the present simple negative form, there are two third-person singular auxiliary verbs: *isn't* or *doesn't*.

Isn't is used with adjectives or nouns.

Examples: My mum *isn't* angry. She *isn't* a doctor.

Doesn't is used with a main verb in the infinitive form.

Examples: Gabriel *doesn't* work in an office. Rosa *doesn't* eat vegetables.
