

ADMIT-ADMITTED-ADMITTED



- to agree that you did something bad, or that something bad is true
- to say something is true

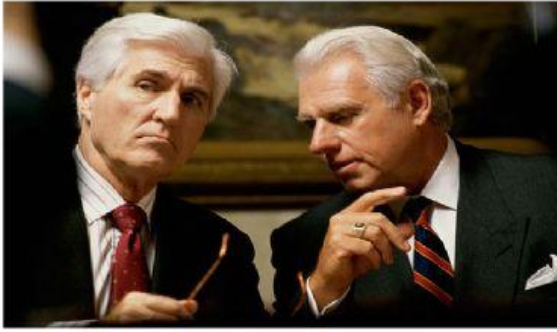
- To allow someone to enter a place

Examples:

Both men **admitted to** taking illegal drugs.
I was wrong – I **admit** it.
She finally **admitted the** truth.

It says on the ticket '**admit one**'.
No one will be **admitted to** the Zoom meeting without valid ID.

ADVISE-ADVISED-ADVISED



- to tell someone that they should do something

- to tell somebody what you think is best

Examples:

I **advised** him **to** take a good decision.

The doctor **advised** him **to** exercise more.

Authorities are **advising** against travel during the pandemic time.

AGREE-AGREED-AGREED



- to have the same opinion as someone

- To decide something with someone

- to say you will do something that someone asks you to do

Examples:

I **agree with** you.

We all **agreed that** mistakes had been made.

They have finally **agreed on a name for their baby**.

We never **agree on/about** anything.

They **agreed to meet** on Sunday.

We **agreed** to share the cost.

We can't agree on which city to visit.

She **agreed to help** the old man.

AFFECT-AFFECTED-AFFECTED



- to cause a change in someone or something



- to cause a strong motion, especially sadness



- to change or influence

Examples:

The problems are **affecting** him.

Try not to let her criticism **affect** you.

Global warming has **affected** the planet.

AFFORD-AFFORDED-AFFORDED



- to have/not have enough money to buy something or enough time to do something



- to be able to do something without risk.

Examples:

Can we *afford* a new house?
I *can't afford* to wait.

We *can't afford* to waste time.
They *can afford* to buy a new car every year.
