

Practice 20.2 A Combining Sentences Using Compound Subjects, Verbs, and Object.

Read the sentences. Combine the sentences in group into a single sentence. Identify each combination as compound subject, compound or compound object.

Example: Sara likes movies. Jo likes them too.

Answer: Sara and Jo like movies. — compound subject

1. The farmer irrigated his crops. He also weeded them.
2. Margo studies ballet. Olga studies ballet.
3. I put ketchup on my hamburger. I put mustard on it too.
4. Sam phoned me last night. Jewel phoned me last night. April also phoned me last night.
5. Claude likes crosswords. He likes word jumbles. He likes most other word games too.
6. Sam plays soccer. I do too.
7. Yesterday Alexis called. She invited me to her house.
8. We may take a train. We may take a bus. We may take a car.
9. They serve a good breakfast. They serve a bad lunch.
10. Every morning, Liz exercises on her treadmill. Then she swims at the town pool.
