- ed describes a person's own feelings

bored confused interested excited
surprised

This lesson is difficult. I am confused!
Kate had nothing to do; she was very bored.

- ing describes a situation, a thing, or a person that CAUSES the feelings

boring confusing interesting exciting
surprising

This lecture is very confusing. I don't understand.

(predictions, offers, promises, intentions and decisions)

predictions, especially after I (don't) think....
I think **he'll become** a lawyer.

We use **will** for **offers and promises**
I'll **carry** your bags.

instant decisions
I **won't reveal** your secret
I'm thirsty. Oh, I'll **bring** you a glass of water.

predictions, especially when they're based on what we can see
Look at that girl. **She's going to cry.**

We use **going to** for **intentions**
I'm **going to visit** my granny next weekend.
