SHORTAGE OF NURSES

I Nurses are considered the heroes of the healthcare world, tirelessly¹ caring for a patient's every need. Today, unfortunately, there is a shortage² of more than seven million nurses all over the world, and the immediate future doesn't look any better. According to a recent report from the International Council of Nurses, there could be a shortage of up to 13 million nurses globally by 2030. This could mean major problems for healthcare services, 5 affecting millions.

II One of the causes of this shortage is the world's aging³ population. While the average person in the 1950s lived to the age of 50, today, thanks to medical advancements, people live well into their 70s, and, in some countries, even into their 80s or 90s. Although this is a positive development, the reality is that chronic diseases are common among older people, and they will often require more nursing care. There simply aren't enough nurses 10 to meet this growing demand.

III In addition, there aren't enough young nurses entering the field to replace the ones who are leaving. Many nurses take early retirement because of the increasingly stressful workload. "My friends and I retired early because of physical and emotional burnout⁴!" says Tracy Beckman, a London nurse. Today's youth prefer higher paying careers that offer better conditions and more flexibility. And for those who do choose nursing, there are not enough 5 programs to train them.

IV Sadly, the shortage of nurses can lead to serious problems in healthcare. Fewer nurses means that each one has a greater workload, and that increases fatigue⁵, which can lead to mistakes. "I've given patients the wrong medicine because I was tired and overworked⁶," admits Na'ama Grayson, a nurse in Be'er Sheva. "And many of my friends have made similar mistakes." In remote areas, the lack of available nurses can result in the closure of 10 clinics, leaving many people without services at all.

V In light of the above, healthcare systems and governments must take immediate action. Governments should provide more funding⁷ for nursing programs. Also, nurses should have higher salaries and better working conditions, as well as shorter shifts, so that they have the time and energy to properly care for each patient. It is also important to introduce technology like video conferencing in order to treat people in hard-to-reach areas. With 5 these improvements, healthcare systems will be able to stem⁸ the growing shortage of nurses and provide better healthcare for all.
