"Perhaps you could show us just how a solar heating system works, Scott," says Dave, who has noticed that Scott is holding a bundle of papers.

"Sure. Have a look at this diagram here – it's of a solar-heated house."

After Scott has finished explaining the diagram, Michele gives a small sigh of relief. "At least it's getting clearer now," she says.

"Well, as we've got plenty of sunshine in Saskatchewan, I guess it would work here as well as anywhere else," Dave adds, thoughtfully.

"It definitely will. But, of course you will need 'regular' electricity to operate lights and household appliances. But who knows – even solar cookers are being developed, so you may be able to serve your guests 'sunburgers' in a few years' time!" answers Scott, amused at his culinary joke.
