Wildlife Corridors

What happens to animals when we build cities in the middle of their homes? We build highways right through the animals' habitat—the area where they live. This causes many problems for animals. For example, deer may try to cross a busy highway in order to find food and shelter. Birds may not hear the call of other birds because of traffic noise.

The good news is that more cities are designing wildlife corridors. These corridors help animals go where they need to go in order to survive. A wildlife corridor connects one habitat to another. A corridor may be a bridge without cars over a busy highway or a body of water that provides a place for birds to migrate.

You can even plan a wildlife corridor in your own backyard. To create a corridor, simply plant flowers that attract birds and butterflies. This way they can safely travel from backyard to backyard.
