So you've decided you want to go to university. But how do you decide what course to do? There are two types of courses: 'vocational' courses, which train you for a particular job like film production, and 'academic' courses like geography or chemistry, which give you skills that you could use in several different types of job. If you're not sure yet what career you want, an academic course would be a better choice. The crucial thing is to go for a subject that you'll really love because you'll be studying it for three or four years. Don't choose the course that you think will get you the best-paid job, or the one that your father or mother studied and advises you to do.

After you've chosen your subject, how do you choose from the hundreds of universities and thousands of courses? Firstly, read about the courses themselves. Check precisely what they cover, how they are taught and examined, and what the teachers are like. Next, think about how far from home you want to live, and what sports, arts and social facilities each university offers. Finally, go to university open days to see what a particular university is like, and think about whether you might be happy there.

Don't decide too hastily. Studying at university will cost a lot of money and affect the rest of your life. You might find it useful to take a 'gap year' first, when you can spend a year working, travelling or doing voluntary work. You'll learn about yourself and typically get useful life experience, which might help you to choose what you want to do in the future.
