ORIGIN OF HALLOWEEN

- The origin of many traditions on October 31st dates back to a pagan festival that celebrated the end of the harvest and the arrival of cold weather. This event is symbolically linked to the death of one cycle and the birth of another.
- The Celts referred to this time of transition between light and darkness as SAMHAIN and believed that the deceased could communicate with the living.
- Irish and Scottish immigrants brought the tradition to the United States, where it evolved into Halloween. The name Halloween comes from "All Hallows' Eve."



ORIGIN OF “LA CASTANYADA”

- The tradition of eating chestnuts on All Saints' Day comes from ancient rituals that celebrated the arrival of winter and the end of the harvest.
- Chestnuts were associated with the remembrance of the dead.
- Additionally, their consumption was part of many cultures' religious commemorations and traditional festivities during this time of year.
