SUBJECT


Noun or Pronoun

PREDICATE

Verb

- The **subject** is the who (or what) the sentence is about.
- The **predicate** tells what the subject does.

The big green frog	jumped across the log.
My sweet grandmother	wore a blue dress.
The old shack	blew over in the wind.



Every **complete sentence** is made up of a subject and a predicate.

The **subject** is whom or what a sentence is about.

The **predicate** is made up of all the words in a sentence that tell what happens.
