Technology Report

In today's report, we look at a new trend in technology called the *internet of things*.

The internet of things means putting tiny computers into everyday electronic appliances, such as toasters and microwaves. With this new technology, appliances can communicate with their users—and with other appliances!

Many companies now sell products that are part of the internet of things, like a smart toaster. It remembers your favorite kind of toast: light or dark. Companies have also designed a smart coffee maker. Not only can it measure water and coffee, but it can also remember to put milk in your coffee at breakfast and make black coffee in the afternoon. In addition, there's a smart alarm clock that can show you the weather, play music, and even communicate with other devices and give you information. For example, it can tell you, "Your coffee maker needs more water."



And that's only the beginning. Now, it's possible to have a smart home, in which the lights, heater, and air conditioner change automatically when family members come home. This makes the home comfortable, and it saves a lot of energy. The internet of things could change many parts of our daily lives.

But do people really want this? Do they really need technology everywhere? One company asked people about their opinions on smart appliances. Some answers were surprising. A smart refrigerator can buy more food online, but people didn't want that because the refrigerator could make mistakes.

Some people say that smart technology will someday be as important as the telephone. But, in fact, many of these products are not useful, or even practical. Companies should learn more about the technology that people really want.
