Exam REMINDER

Understanding the whole meaning

- In the open cloze you have to write a word of your own in each gap.
- Remember to read for the general meaning of the text. Try to understand if the text is about the past, present or future. Use the correct time expressions and verb forms to match the tenses in that part of the text. For example, *I'd already tried the shoes on _____ I bought them*. Firstly, we need a time expression in the gap. Secondly, we know from the tenses that the person tried the shoes on first and then bought them. So, the missing word here is *before*.
- It's important to read the words before and after each gap. In the example above, the words *tried on* and *bought* help you a lot. Don't forget that the word you need is often one part of a fixed phrase or phrasal verb.
