In \_\_\_\_\_, New Year's Eve, known as "Nochevieja," is a big celebration. Many people gather in the main squares of cities to eat 12 grapes at the stroke of midnight. Each grape represents good luck for one month of the coming year. Afterward, there are fireworks and parties that continue until the early hours of the morning.

In \_\_\_\_\_, the New Year's celebrations are famous for their colourful and energetic atmosphere. People often dress in white, believing it brings good luck. On the beaches, like Copacabana in Rio de Janeiro, massive crowds gather to watch fireworks and enjoy live music concerts. Many also throw flowers into the ocean as an offering to Yemanjá, the goddess of the sea, for blessings in the new year.

\_\_\_\_\_ has its own vibrant traditions for New Year's, with families and friends coming together for a festive meal. It is common to eat 12 grapes too, and make a wish for each one. They also use colourful decorations, like piñatas, and set off fireworks to welcome the new year with joy and excitement.

In \_\_\_\_\_, the Lunar New Year is the most important celebration. It is usually later than the international New Year, but the festive spirit is just as strong. Families clean their homes to sweep away bad luck and make traditional foods like "banh chung" (sticky rice cake). The highlight is the midnight moment when fireworks light up the sky, and people exchange good wishes and give "li xi" (lucky money) to children for good fortune.
