Now, LISTEN to the AUDIO and SELECT the correct pronunciation for the suffix -ed: /t/, /d/ or /id/.

## CHOOSE THE CORRECT ANSWER:

Rule 1: If the verb base ends in a voiced / voiceless sound, then the -ed ending sounds like "t". The "t" is blended together with the previous consonant and not pronounced as an extra syllable.

Rule 2: If the verb base ends in a **voiced / voiceless sound**, then the **–ed** ending **sounds** like "d".
