PAST PERFECT	We <u>had been there</u> before.	They <u>hadn't answered</u> by the time we got there.	<u>Had they slept</u> before in a tent?
PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS	They <u>had been reading</u> .	I <u>hadn't been doing</u> anything.	<u>Had you been failing</u> before now?
FUTURE SIMPLE	I <u>will sing</u> a song.	She <u>won't perform</u> tonight.	<u>Will they build</u> a house here?
FUTURE CONTINUOUS	I <u>will be going</u> home for Christmas.	They <u>won't be getting</u> married after all.	<u>Will she be visiting</u> us next year?
FUTURE PERFECT	They <u>will have sold</u> the house.	We <u>won't have finished</u> by then.	<u>Will the car be fixed</u> by Monday?
FUTURE PERFECT CONTINUOUS	At night, they <u>will have been driving</u> for hours.	It <u>won't have been snowing</u> .	<u>Will he have been catching</u> fish for hours by Sunday?
