

Exercise 11 (p. 93)

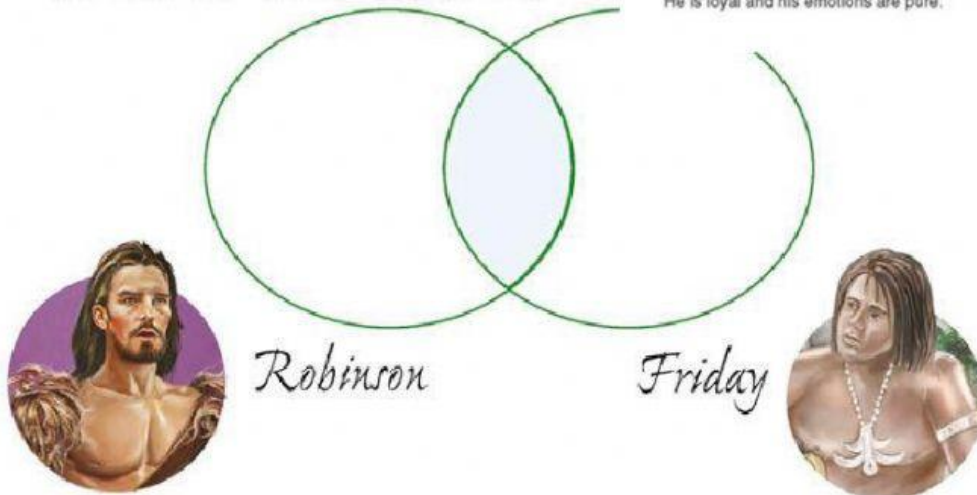
