- Verb + V-ing

Form	Common verbs	Example
Verb + V-ing	admit, avoid, consider, delay, deny, enjoy, imagine, keep, mind, miss, postpone, quit, resist, risk, suggest, dislike, appreciate, tolerate, etc.	Can you imagine living in space? She couldn't resist eating the cake.

- Verb + Infinitive and Verb + Object + Infinitive

Form	Common verbs	Example
Verb + to-infinitive	agree, arrange, attempt, choose, decide, fail, hope, learn, manage, offer, plan, seem, etc.	I agreed to help Shona with her homework. The driver attempted to remove the flat tire.
Verb + object + to-infinitive	advise, allow, command, forbid, force, invite, order, persuade, remind, teach, tell, etc.	Peter advised Ron to call the police. Esther reminded her teacher to set some revisions.
Một số trường hợp các động từ dùng được với cả 2 dạng nhưng có thể có ý nghĩa khác nhau	ask, expect, help, intend, like, love, hate, mean, prefer, want, wish, etc.	I really expect to go to the party. I really expect Sally to go to the party. *Note this difference: - Dad wants to wash the car = Dad washes the car. - Dad wants John to wash the car = John washes the car.

The Future of Water

Even at a time when global warming and the effect it will have on our water supply is often in the news, those of us living in developed countries cannot imagine not having a shower whenever we want, or drinking water when we are thirsty.
