This scandal **shed light on** the darker side of the pharmaceutical industry, where profit motives sometimes overshadow humanitarian concerns. The public outrage **put paid** to Shkreli's **lucrative** business. He was barred for life from the pharmaceutical industry and fined \$64.6m by a US court.

But ironically his imprisonment was not related to expensive drug pricing. In 2018 Shkreli faced legal tiscyurn 5) \_\_\_\_\_ again and eventually was jailed for seven years for securities fraud. Many on social media said Shkreli was getting what he deserved. On Twitter, the top hashtag and keyword related to his arrest was #Karma.

Turing Pharmaceuticals' actions sparked a broader conversation about the ethics of drug pricing and the need for regulations to prevent such exploitative practices.
