SWEAR BY

The phrase "**swear by**" means to have complete trust or confidence in something or someone. It is often used to express strong belief in the effectiveness, reliability, or truth of something.

- "*I swear by this brand of skincare – it works wonders for my skin!*"
- "*She swears by the benefits of meditation for reducing stress.*"

In the context of food, if someone **swears by** a particular dish, it means they believe it is the best or most reliable choice for them.

STAPLES

The word "**staples**" has a couple of meanings, but in the context of food, "**staples**" refers to essential or basic items that are regularly consumed in a particular diet or culture. These are the foods that people eat frequently and form the foundation of their meals.

- "*Rice is a staple food in many Asian countries.*"
- "*Bread and potatoes are staples in many Western diets.*"

In a broader sense, "**staples**" can also refer to basic and important things needed for a particular activity or situation.

ON THE GO
