1 **A**dvances in medical technology are helping many people who have Parkinson's disease. While there is still no cure, new innovative devices are improving the quality of life for Parkinson's sufferers.

2 Parkinson's disease affects a person's muscles and their ability to move. It is caused by a problem with the nerve cells in the brain. There is an important chemical called dopamine, which helps send signals to different parts of the brain, telling it when to move parts of the body. However, people with Parkinson's don't produce enough dopamine. As a result, they can't send the correct signals to their arms or legs when they want to move.

3 The main symptom of Parkinson's is constant tremors or shaking of the arms and legs, so patients tend to move very slowly. They have difficulty balancing when they are standing or walking. They may also have trouble speaking and eating. Parkinson's is a progressive disease, which means it gradually gets worse, but this can take a number of years.

4 There are many different kinds of medication to treat Parkinson's. Although some have been successful in slowing down the disease, none are able to completely cure it. One problem that scientists face is monitoring how much medication is needed by each patient. This is where technology is important. New wearable devices detect tremors and classify them based on their intensity. The data is then sent to doctors, allowing them to track patients' reactions to different medication doses.

5 There may be no cure for Parkinson's yet, but with new advancements in drugs and wearable technology, there is hope that patients can have a better quality of life.
