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- What does James learn at the end of the story?
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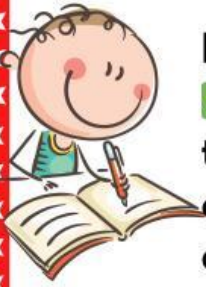
