Watch out!

Types of modern scams

- A. Marketing departments frequently employ email and texts to keep companies in touch with their customer base and inform them of new products, sales and potential discounts. _____¹ Yet hiding in there could well be a message from someone impersonating a company in an attempt to get your personal information in a scam known as phishing. They generally contain links that will take you to a fake website where fraudsters will encourage you to enter personal information including bank details. _____² The best way to avoid these is to never click on links in unsolicited emails and texts and if there's an offer made that is of interest to you, go and look for it on the company's website first.
- B. Related to phishing is 'vishing' - a combination of 'voice' and 'phishing' - where you will receive a call from a scammer who pretends to be your bank. They will often use a false emergency, such as a security breach and the bank and ask you to move your money to a new account. They may even encourage you to call them by saying that a high value item has been charged to your account and you need to call a given number if you don't recognise it. _____³ Should you receive an unexpected call from your bank, tell them you will get back to them and phone the bank's number on your card.
- C. Dating apps are such a convenient and familiar way to begin a relationship these days that people quickly forget they don't always know who they are really talking to when they match with someone. _____⁴ This will usually happen once the victim has been made to feel special and is personally invested in the person they have met, having been groomed over a period of time. The effects can be devastating emotionally and financially as it's natural for anyone to build a picture in their head of the person they are speaking to without realising they're being taken for a ride. _____⁵ Even then, caution is advised.
