
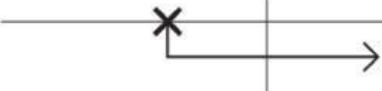

# Present Perfect Progressive



## SHORTER TIME FRAMES

	Present Perfect	Present Perfect Progressive
<b>Pattern</b>	have / has + p.p. (past participle)	have / has + been + -ing verb
<b>Use</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>shows a finished past action</li> <li>does not show when it occurred</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>show a continuing action that started in the past, continues to the present, and will continue into the future</li> </ul>
<b>Diagram</b>		
<b>Time Markers</b>	No time marker is needed, but for emphasis it is possible to use: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>already</li> <li>yet</li> <li>still</li> <li>ever</li> <li>never</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>for</li> <li>since</li> <li>all</li> </ul>
<b>Examples</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>I <b>have read</b> <i>The Hobbit</i>. (I have finished reading it.)</li> <li>She <b>has</b> already <b>written</b> her report. (She has finished writing it.)</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>I <b>have been reading</b> <i>The Hobbit</i> all night. (I will continue to read it.)</li> <li>She <b>has been writing</b> her report for two hours. (She will continue to write it.)</li> </ul>



### ! IMPORTANT MESSAGE

#### Shorter Time Frames

For shorter time frames (usually within one day), the present perfect progressive is the natural-sounding choice for a continuing action.

- My son **has been eating** for half an hour.
- They **have been writing** emails since 7:00 am.



#### For, Since & All

- For* and *all* show the **duration** of an action.
- Since* shows the **starting point** of an action.



# Continuing Actions

## LONGER TIME FRAMES

	Present Perfect	Present Perfect Progressive
<b>Pattern</b>	have / has + p.p.	have / has + been + -ing verb
<b>Use</b>	shows an action that started in the past, continues to the present, and <b>may</b> continue into the future	shows an action that started in the past, continues to the present, and <b>will</b> continue into the future
<b>Diagram</b>		
<b>Time Markers</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• for</li> <li>• since</li> <li>• all</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• for</li> <li>• since</li> <li>• all</li> </ul>
<b>Examples</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I <b>have studied</b> English for eight years.</li> <li>• He <b>has lived</b> in the same house since he was a child.</li> <li>• She <b>has talked</b> about her new job for days.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I <b>have been studying</b> English for eight years.</li> <li>• He <b>has been living</b> in the same house since he was a child.</li> <li>• She <b>has been talking</b> about her new job for days.</li> </ul>



### Longer Time Frames

For longer time frames, the present perfect and the present perfect progressive have the same meaning. To emphasize that the action will continue into the future, use the present perfect progressive.

- I **have studied** English for two years. (*emphasis on the past to the present*)
- I **have been studying** English for two years. (*emphasis also on the future*)
- I **have lived** in Tokyo for 12 years. (*emphasis on the past to the present*)
- I **have been living** in Tokyo for 12 years. (*emphasis also on the future*)

### For, Since & All

- *For* and *all* show the **duration** of an action.
- *Since* shows the **starting point** of an action.

# Conclusion & Exceptions

- ✓ For short-term continuing actions (in the first chart), the *-ing form is a lot more common*. For example, it sounds much better to say *He has been writing his report for two hours* than *He has written his report for two hours*.
- ✓ For longer time frames, the present perfect and present perfect progressive can be confusing because they are so similar. But in most cases, *there is no difference in meaning* between a long, continuing action using the present perfect and one using the present perfect progressive, so students can use whichever tense they want—both are likely correct.
- ✓ Students will undoubtedly ask you which tense is the better one to use for longer time frames. Point out that *native speakers usually prefer the present perfect because it is shorter*, but they will use the present perfect progressive when they really want to emphasize that an action will continue into the future.
- ✓ For instance, *native speakers would more likely say I have lived in Vancouver for five years than I have been living in Vancouver for five years, though both are correct*. In a job interview, though, when discussing their work experience, native speakers would likely say *I have been working with children for eight years* to emphasize that they will continue to do so (though, again, *I have worked with children for eight years* is also correct).

## 4.1. Affirmative sentences in the *Present Perfect Progressive*

Long forms	Contracted forms
I <b>have been playing</b> handball.	I've <b>been playing</b> handball.
You <b>have been playing</b> handball.	You've <b>been playing</b> handball.
He <b>has been playing</b> handball.	He's <b>been playing</b> handball.



### Example Sentences in the Present Perfect Progressive Tense

## Present Perfect Progressive

**A** Mary **has been studying** for 4 hours.



**B** Ted **has been digging** the garden.  
He's covered in mud.



**B** Tom **has been painting** his house. His hair is all red.



**A** Janet **has been ironing** some shirts and jeans since 11pm.



- I have been studying **for** three hours.
- I have been watching TV **since** 7pm.
- Anton has been playing football **for** a long time.
- He has been living in Bangkok **since** he left school.
- I'm tired <sup>[now]</sup> because I've **been running**

## 4.2. Negative sentences in the *Present Perfect Progressive*

Long forms	Contracted forms
I <b>have not been playing</b> handball.	I <b>haven't been playing</b> handball.
	I've <b>not been playing</b> handball.*
You <b>have not been playing</b> handball.	You <b>haven't been playing</b> handball.
	You've <b>not been playing</b> handball.*
He <b>has not been playing</b> handball.	He <b>hasn't been playing</b> handball.
	He's <b>not been playing</b> handball.*

\* This form is rarely used.

### Negative sentences in the Present Perfect Continuous Tense

Subject + „have/has” + „not” + „been” + „-ing” form + object

*Jack **hasn't been playing** basketball for a long time.*

*I **have not been studying** in the library for 3 years.*

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- Tara *hasn't been feeling well* **for** two weeks.
- Mary *hasn't been visiting us* **since** March.
- We **have not been smoking**.
- You *don't understand* <sup>[now]</sup> because you **haven't been listening**.
- They **have not (haven't) been playing** in the room.

### 4.3. Questions in the *Present Perfect Progressive*

Long forms	Contracted forms
<b>Have</b> I <b>been playing</b> handball?	not possible
<b>Have</b> you <b>been playing</b> handball?	
<b>Has</b> he <b>been playing</b> handball?	

- *Have you been studying English?*
- *Has it been raining for three hours?*
- *Has she been teaching French since 2000?*
- *Has the baby been crying since he got up?*
- *Have you been listening to me?*
