Explanation

Past modals are used to speculate about past events or express regrets about what should or could have happened.

- 1. Should have + past participle \rightarrow Used to express regret or criticism.
 - o They should have been more careful before accusing people.
 - o The government should have investigated more fairly.
- Could have + past participle → Indicates a missed opportunity or possibility.
 - Some directors could have continued working if they had changed their names.
 - They could have fought against the blacklist, but many were too afraid.
- 3. **Might have / May have + past participle** → Used for speculation about what possibly happened.
 - o Some of the accused might have been innocent.
 - o They may have moved to Europe to continue their careers.
