

Past Modals for Speculation & Regret – Explanation and Exercises

Explanation

Past modals are used to speculate about past events or express regrets about what should or could have happened.

1. **Should have + past participle** → Used to express regret or criticism.
 - *They should have been more careful before accusing people.*
 - *The government should have investigated more fairly.*
2. **Could have + past participle** → Indicates a missed opportunity or possibility.
 - *Some directors could have continued working if they had changed their names.*
 - *They could have fought against the blacklist, but many were too afraid.*
3. **Might have / May have + past participle** → Used for speculation about what possibly happened.
 - *Some of the accused might have been innocent.*
 - *They may have moved to Europe to continue their careers.*
