

The Age of Majority

The Age of Majority is a term used in the U.S. to describe the legal change from a child to an adult, and is the age when you can do lots of things for the first time. The age of majority is typically 18, but laws about what you can and cannot do at different ages are different in each state. In Virginia, you can buy fireworks when you are 16, but in New Hampshire, you can't buy them until you are 21. In Texas, you can ride a moped (a motorcycle with a small engine which cannot go very fast) when you are 15, but you have to wait until you are 16 in California. In Kansas, you can drive a car when you are 14, but in most states you have to wait until you are 16. In all states, you don't have to be any special age to ride a bicycle. But it makes no difference what state you live in when you go to the movies—you can see an R-rated movie when you are 16, but you have to be 17 to see an NC-17-rated movie.
