MUST Diana: 'You must study more!'	Diana told me that I had to study more.
MUSTN'T Matei: 'You mustn't be late for school!'	Matei told me that I mustn't be late for school.
WILL Roger: 'When will Ana and Maria move to Italy?'	Roger asked me when Ana & Maria would move to Italy.
WOULD Elena: 'I would like to visit Paris.'	Elena told me she would like to visit Paris.
