-Distinctive features for /k/:

Include being a velar, voiceless, and stop consonant.

-Sentence sample:

I came to the meeting yesterday

-Phonetic transcription:

/bɪ'gæn/

-Distinctive features for /g/:

Include being a consonant, voiced, and having a constricted glottis.

-Sentence sample:

My heart began to race.



7. Fun



-Phonetic transcription:

/fʌn/

-Distinctive features for /f/:

Include being a labial consonant, a voiceless consonant, and a continuant.

-Sentence sample:

I like to play sport for fun.

8. Phone



-Phonetic transcription:

/foʊn/

-Distinctive features for /f/:

Include being a labial consonant, a voiceless consonant, and a continuant.

-Sentence sample:

What is your phone number?

9. Coffee



-Phonetic transcription:

/'kɑ:.fi/

-Distinctive features for /f/:

Include being a labial consonant, a voiceless consonant, and a continuant.

-Sentence sample:

I always drink coffee with milk.

-Distinctive features for /v/:

Include being a consonant, a strident sound, and an anterior sound

-Sentence sample:

Over the vacation

11. Clever

-Phonetic transcription:

/'klev.ə/

-Distinctive features for /v/:

Include being a consonant, a strident sound, and an anterior sound

-Sentence sample:

My mother is very clever with her hands.



12. Give

-Phonetic transcription:

/gɪv/

-Distinctive features for /v/:

Include being a consonant, a strident sound, and an anterior sound

-Sentence sample:

Can you please give my book?



13. Thank



-Phonetic transcription:

/θæŋk/

-Distinctive features for /θ/:

The voiceless consonant /θ/ include that it is dental, fricative, and aspirated

-Sentence sample:

Thank you very much.

14. Nothing



-Phonetic transcription:

/θæŋk/

-Distinctive features for /θ/:

The voiceless consonant /θ/ include that it is dental, fricative, and aspirated

-Sentence sample:

Nothing is impossible

-Phonetic transcription:

/ˈfɑːðə/



-Distinctive features for /ð/:

Include that it is a voiced, non-strident, and continuant sound. It is also produced with the tongue between the upper and lower teeth.

-Sentence sample:

My father is a doctor.

18. They

-Phonetic transcription:

/ðeɪ/



-Distinctive features for /ð/:

Include that it is a voiced, non-strident, and continuant sound. It is also produced with the tongue between the upper and lower teeth.

-Sentence sample:

They are my friends.

19. Cent



-Phonetic transcription:

/sent/

-Distinctive features for /s/:

Include being a sibilant, consonant, and voiced sound.

-Sentence sample:

When he arrived in America he didn't have a cent.

20. Missing



-Phonetic transcription:

/'mɪs.ɪŋ/

-Distinctive features for /s/:

Include being a sibilant, consonant, and voiced sound.

-Sentence sample:

He was listed as missing in action.

21. Decide

-Phonetic transcription:

/dɪ'saɪd/

-Distinctive features for /s/:

Include being a sibilant, consonant, and voiced sound.

-Sentence sample:

My son won the race and received a badge.



22. Zero

-Phonetic transcription:

/ˈzɪr.oʊ/

-Distinctive features for /z/:

Is made by vibrating the vocal cords while pushing air between the tongue and the roof of the mouth. It is a voiced sound, which means the vocal cords vibrate while making the sound.

-Sentence sample:

There is zero tolerance on that issue.



23. Crazy

-Phonetic transcription:

/ˈkreɪ.zi/



-Distinctive features for /z/:

Is made by vibrating the vocal cords while pushing air between the tongue and the roof of the mouth. It is a voiced sound, which means the vocal cords vibrate while making the sound.

-Sentence sample:

You got me crazy.

24. Noisy

-Phonetic transcription:

/ˈnɔɪ.zi/



-Distinctive features for /z/:

Is made by vibrating the vocal cords while pushing air between the tongue and the roof of the mouth. It is a voiced sound, which means the vocal cords vibrate while making the sound.
