

Present Perfect Continuous (I have been doing) - Summary

The present perfect continuous is formed with **have/has + been + verb (-ing)** and is used for:

1. Actions that have just stopped or have a present result:

- *You're out of breath. Have you been running?* (You're out of breath now.)
- *He's been working very hard.* (He is tired now.)

2. Actions that started in the past and are still happening:

- *It has been raining for two hours.* (It started two hours ago and is still raining.)
- *How long have you been learning English?*

3. Repeated actions over a period of time:

- *She's been playing tennis since she was eight.*
- *They've been going there for years.*

4. To stress out how long is action on progress or was in progress (if it has just finished)

- *I've been learning English since school.*
- *She has been cleaning that room for tre hours.*

Comparison with Present Continuous

- **Present Continuous (I am doing) → Describes actions happening right now.**
 - *I'm working now.*
 - *It's raining.*
- **Present Perfect Continuous (I have been doing) → Describes actions that started in the past and continue or have a recent effect.**
 - *I've been working hard. Now I'm taking a break.*
 - *It has been raining. (The ground is wet.)*
