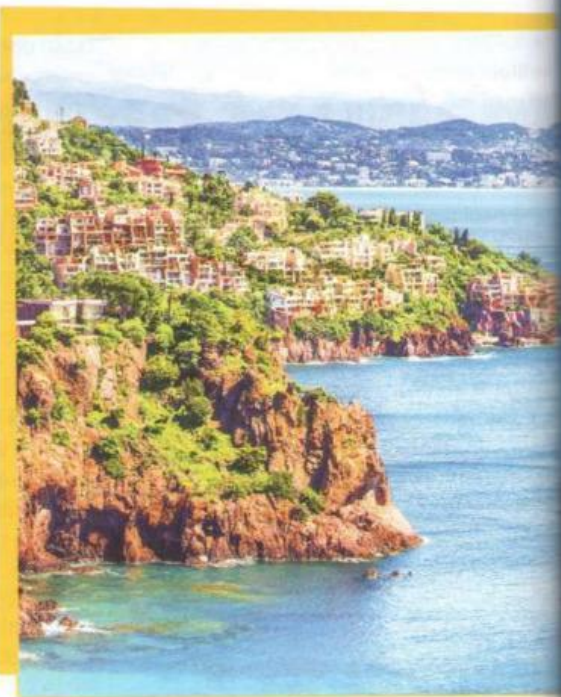

1 Yushan

Taiwan will delight you with its tradition of martial arts, delicious food and natural splendours. These include Yushan, or Jade Mountain, which is sure to fascinate people with environmental awareness. Yushan has eleven peaks, the highest of which is 3,952 m, and is a spectacular place to hike. It is located in Yushan National Park, home to many bird species, wild monkeys, mountain goats and more. After your hike, take a rest at the town of Tungpu, with a long soak in a hot spring!

2 Crete

Visit Crete for the holiday that has it all! Here you can visit Knossos Palace, and wander around the Old Town in Heraklion. Experience the palm forest of Vai, and take a swim in the island's warm waters. Meet the famously hospitable Cretans and taste one of the healthiest cuisines in the world. In the evening, let us treat you to local desserts and teach you the traditional music and dancing that make this island home.

3 Copenhagen

Copenhagen charms children and adults alike, with its canals, 'Castle Island', colourful houses and the oldest still-functioning roller coaster in the world. Everyone must visit 'The Little Mermaid'. Made famous by Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tale, the bronze sculpture sitting on a rock reminds visitors of what every Danish sailor knew: that the Mermaids were there, waiting until the 300 years of their existence were over, so they could turn into sea foam.

4 Ushuaia

Tierra del Fuego or the Land of Fire is a group of islands at the southernmost part of South America. The main island has the shape of a triangle and lies on the border between Argentina and Chile. In the Argentine part of the island, you can visit the town of Ushuaia. With almost 18 hours of daylight in the summer, and five months of excellent snow conditions for winter sports lovers, Ushuaia is a perfect destination for all seasons.

5 Kamianets-Podilskyi

The city of Kamianets-Podilskyi, in western Ukraine, is famous for one of the most picturesque castles in the country, whose location on the top of a huge rock offers its visitors breathtaking views. Stroll through the city's Old Town, which is surrounded by the Smotrych River canyon, and visit the monuments of this historic city. Don't forget to visit the Miniature Museum to see a small version of the city's castle as well as models of other Ukrainian castles.

6 Liechtenstein

Whether you want to relax, experience culture or try sports in the heart of the Alps, Liechtenstein is the place to go! Strangely enough, the country has no airport of its own, but you can easily access it, as there are three international airports nearby, two of which are located in Switzerland and one in Germany. Pushing Boundaries

An article in the Journal of Travel Medicine reports on the risk factors in commercial adventure tourism in New Zealand. Client safety is a big issue in this sector. The study was based on a questionnaire completed (1) _____. One hundred and twenty-seven groups responded, with a total of almost one million clients annually, covering twenty-one different adventure activities between them.

For client injury, the risk factors (2) _____ clients not following instructions, an inappropriate level of client skill, ability or fitness, and changeable or unpredictable weather conditions. Of course, there are also organisational factors (3) _____ they may come across, not enough guides, or guides having inadequate experience or qualifications. Failure to check the weather conditions is also an important factor. What is interesting is (4) _____ to get injured than domestic tourists. This suggests that the overseas tourist is not familiar with the place they are visiting; therefore the risk of injury is increased.

The activities which reported the highest numbers of client injury were activities related to ecotourism, horse riding, white-water rafting and snow-related activities. For minor injuries, it was found that there was a serious failure in reporting from the operators of the activities. The most common reasons given for reported injuries (5) _____. There was also a lack of consistency in following safety management measures across the industry. In some cases, this may be due to operators trying to cut costs.

The general conclusion was that the adventure tourism sector had to address the issue of reporting injuries and pay greater attention to safety management procedures. It was also highlighted that the industry needed to consider risk management for more minor incidents, (6) _____. In other words, safety measures for the prevention of both serious and minor injuries in the adventure tourism sector should take the highest priority.
